In what ways will you use City resources to create housing options that are affordable AND accessible for Cincinnatians with disabilities? \*

My professional career shows that I have been a years-long advocate for affordable housing. I worked for the Affordable Housing Advocates (AHA) where I wrote a regular column on affordable housing policy and edited the first ever "State of Affordable Housing in Hamilton County" report. Later I served as the Director of Education for the Greater Cincinnati Coalition for the Homeless where I edited the report, "How to Overcome Local Opposition to Affordable Housing". If I am elected I will continue my policy advocacy for proven, best practices solutions to the affordable housing crisis in our city. This includes supporting a variety of funding allocations for affordable housing such as CDGB and HOME, the Local Affordable Housing Trust Fund, supporting applications for affordable housing tax credits, and other funding "tools" that are available such as rapid rehousing funds. Other strategies include working collaboratively with CHMA and other affordable housing developers, and building in "inclusionary zoning" where possible. I have great respect for the work of People Working Cooperatively and would like to expand their work to serve more Cincinnatians who need support to make their homes more accessible.

## What are your goals for increasing affordable and accessible transportation options for Cincinnatians with disabilities? \*

As a city council member I will take leadership on this critical issue by requesting to be appointed to council committees that handles transportation legislative items. I will serve as an active member to address METRO's lack of adequate transportation options for persons with disabilities. I will advocate from a place of personal experience, as I used METRO for school and work and our son is a lifelong wheelchair user who has used the ACCESS paratransit. I will work with my peers on council, Hamilton County leaders, METRO, and community groups to work towards funding solutions to expand affordable and accessible options.

# In what ways will your office work with the Cincinnati Accessibility Board of Advisors (CABA) to increase ADA compliance in businesses across the city? \*

I will take whatever action is necessary to increase ADA compliance in businesses across the city. Our son is a wheelchair user and we have experienced 21 years of limitations for persons using wheelchairs. I am well aware of the loss of access and potential revenues for businesses who are not ADA compliant.

### How can the City of Cincinnati be more inclusive of people with disabilities and their families? \*

The City can ensure inclusivity for people with disabilities and their families by ensuring both physical access (sidewalks, curb-cuts, ramps, general access), access to accessible housing (including visitability and affordability), jobs (I served as a Statewide Commissioner for OOD where I worked on increasing inclusion in our local businesses), and recreation (our CRC Therapeutic Recreation is among the best in the country and we need to continue to support them), just to name a few.

Our son uses a wheelchair and augmentative communication device, so I am very sensitive to the challenges special families face. I look forward to the opportunity to help promote a more inclusive Cincinnati with your vote!
